I hope you have all enjoyed a relaxing Easter break and the continuation of very mild weather. We have only a week and a half of the term left and then it's school holidays. This term has been an

extremely busy one with sports events, sailing lessons, technology classes, Maxwell Kindergarten visit, and even a trip on the Waimarie.

Recently, Raylene was able to return to work after being laid up following a nasty fall which resulted in a broken ankle. She has not yet fully recovered and will need on-going treatment, but is managing very well with her mobility aid which helps her get around. We are all very glad to see her back, but none more so than her Room 2 students who were very excited to see her!

Despite the fact that our school swimming lessons got off to a late start with the fibre-glassing of the pool taking longer to complete than expected, we have enjoyed using the pool much longer than usual due to the wonderful weather. Our new pool cover has also been a great asset as it helps to keep the pool a few degrees warmer. Many town schools no longer have a pool so we are very fortunate to have this wonderful asset for our school and community.

As mentioned in the previous community newsletter we had two swimming competitions coming up. The first was the Super 6 Intermediate Swimming Sports in which our school competed against Westmere, Faith City, St Anne's, St Marcellin and St Mary's schools. Kai lwi was the only school to field competitors for our West Country team as Waitotara, Ngamatapouri and Brunswick students were unavailable. Our swimmers performed admirably, earning some very good placings and we achieved 4th placing overall, so well done everyone who competed. day 12th April. Our seniors have been out practising their pitching and catching skills for the past few weeks in their spare time, and we have had some great games, too. We are just loving our softball!! Our kids know Westmere wants that Super 6 shield back this year, but they are determined to give them and the other schools a run for their money!!

Another swimming event held this term was the West Cluster swimming sports which is a competition between Kai Iwi, Brunswick, Ngamatapouri, Waitotara, Mosston, Faith City and Westmere schools. We achieved top 3 placings in many events and were only just beaten for first place overall by Westmere. Mac Lawrence and Summitt Storr both achieved 2nd placing in the competition for the senior boys' and senior girls' trophies, with Mac only missing out on first place by 0.3seconds. I was very proud of all our swimmers who swam for all they were worth. It is wonderful to see such spirit and enthusiasm for sport. (Placings will be further on in the newsletter). Many thanks to Mr Harvey for running such a great event. The kids enjoyed the free swim at the end, too.

Sailing has been very successful again this year with all students giving it a go, and many showing real confidence, understanding and ability in mastering the skills of sailing. We have one last lesson this week for the more capable sailors from which we will pick our Kai Iwi team for the Intermediate Sailing competition to be held at Pauri Lake on April 7th. Our team will compete against 7 or 8 other schools for the trophy. I would like to acknowledge Sheryl Ryland, Bob Davies and the rest of the team from Sailing Whanganui and say what a wonderful group of people they are to volunteer their time every week to help our kids learn to sail. We really do appreciate your dedication in providing such an awesome opportunity.

Last week, 15 of our students, Mr Harvey and I were fortunate to be invited, along with other schools, for a trip up the river on the Waimarie. This was generously offered by the Waimarie Trust as a way of teaching our students some of the history of early Whanganui, and the paddle steamer, Waimarie, that plies its waters. We learned many fascinating facts that day and here are just a few: The Waimarie was first built in Britain in 1899 then shipped to New Zealand in 62 packing crates like a giant kitset and rebuilt in Whanganui in 1900 to become part of Alexander Hatrick's fleet of 15 riverboats in 1902. The Waimarie is the only coal-fired paddle steamer in operation in New Zealand. The kids were amazed to learn that back before roads were properly developed, a trip from Wellington to Auckland involved a trip by horse and cart up the coastline from Wellington to Whanganui, then a ride on a paddle steamer from Whanganui to Taumaranui, at which point you could board a train to Auckland! In the museum we learned that when the Opera House floor was replaced, the old boards were used to making flooring and fittings in the rebuild of the Waimarie, which had spent 40 years submerged in the river after an accident. We all came away with a better appreciation for just how important the paddle steamers were in the development of Whanganui and settlements up the river, and what a delightful way to learn about such a grand boat.

On the same day as Super 6 Softball (Thursday April 12th), students in Years 1-3 will be participating in our West Cluster Tabloid sports at Cooks Gardens. All are welcome to attend to watch our littlies enjoy a fun sports event.

Many thanks to everyone who supported the FOKIS pie order fundraiser, and to the staff and parents involved in organising it. FOKIS is our school fundraising group which provides many of the wonderful assets our children enjoy, and so they depend on the support of our parents and community to help raise funds and make our school a wonderful environment in which our children can thrive. FOKIS looks forward to your continued support and involvement in their up-coming fundraising projects throughout the year.

Next term we have decided to move our assembly time to fortnightly on Friday mornings at 9.05am, and they will be held in the school library. The first assembly will be in week 2 of term 2. Everyone is welcome to attend and hopefully we will be able to hear our students a lot better in a smaller, quieter space.
