From a Friend's Last Look – "Kim" – North Korea 2001

Kim had come home, unable to speak. His mother could tell he was in shock and sat with him, soothing him and trying to find out what had happened. Finally he began to open up to her.

"I was with one of my best friends today when two police officers approached us. They grabbed my friend and accused him of being a Christian. One of the officers knocked him to the ground while the other took out his gun. My friend didn't get angry or curse anyone. He...he didn't even try to defend himself.

"Even as the gun was pointed directly at him, his face remained peaceful. He looked straight into my eyes, and without speaking a word, I knew exactly what he was saying. He wanted me to believe the same thing he did. And then he just said, 'Bless them.'"He was executed right in front of me – because he was a Christian. I do not even know what a Christian is. I don't understand any of this."Kim's mother held his head in her hands. There were tears in her eyes. Now is was she who was in shock. She then told him simply, "I understand."

"How could you possibly understand why they would kill my friend?"

She slowly began to tell her son about her Lord Jesus Christ, how He had miraculously been born of a virgin and crucified on a cross to save all those who would believe in Him. As she continued sharing with her eldest son, she began to sob. Now it was she who couldn't go on. She felt the pain of never daring to tell her son about Jesus Christ, lest his fate would be like that of his friend. She also felt the overwhelming joy of knowing that God had not forgotten her son, but allowed someone else to bring him the Gospel.

Finally she told him, "God allowed you to witness the martyrdom of one of His brave children. As those bullets hit his heart, a seed of hope was planted in yours." The son prayed that night and received Jesus Christ into his heart. He was filled with joy as he embraced his mother and thanked her for telling him the truth. But suddenly he began to weep again and appeared distraught. Confused, the mother asked, "Now what's wrong?"

"My brothers," Kim cried, "they do not know Jesus. We must tell them!"His three brothers soon came home and discovered their older brother and mother crying together. Their first thought was that something terrible had happened to their father, and they quickly knelt down beside their mother, asking what was wrong. With unnatural boldness the eldest son stood up and responded, "You should also receive Jesus Christ." Before the evening had passed, all three had done exactly that. The mother was filled with joy! Although she had never dared to speak to her children about her Christian faith, she had diligently prayed for them everyday. Now that her children had accepted Jesus, she began cautiously looking for a Bible. But she could not find any.

Eventually her oldest son secretly crossed the Yalu River into China in search of Bibles. You can imagine the look on his face when he finally came across a miniature Bible in the Korean language. He pleaded with the Christians in China, asking how he could obtain some of those Bibles. Regrettably no more were available. Refusing to admit defeat, he told the Christians the dramatic story of how he had witnessed his friend's death and how he and his brothers had learned of Jesus Christ. Before departing for North Korea, he said, "I am in need of five thousand of these Bibles to share with my family and others in North Korea. I will be back in one month to pick them up."

Hearing of the request, some Christian workers hurriedly printed five thousand copies of the miniature Korean Bibles. Over the next year or so, Kim returned on several occasions to smuggle the Bibles back across the border. All four of these brothers are now actively sharing their faith, knowing firsthand the consequences if they are discovered. Since their last pickup of these Bibles some months ago, no one has heard further news of them.

Transformation. Change. In an instant, by the touch of God, a life can be changed. There is more to life than they had ever imagined. They are not alone. There is a God who loves them and He is truth. In a moment, in a twinkling of an eye, the world is different. It is like everything just went from black and white to color, like suddenly they can see when they were blind before, like they were in prison and now have been set free. Such change is both instant and incremental; it is this that makes a person a revolutionary for Christ—someone willing to risk it all for the Truth. While change often comes in leaps, as it did for Kim and his family, it will also take them a lifetime to work out what has happened in their hearts. They will do this by becoming revolutionaries in their society, smuggling the Truth to as many as they can, working a "resistance" of the world system to find those whose hearts are ready for the Gospel, and working against those who would control how they think, behave, and believe.

People who aren't convinced that what they believe is the Truth don't do such things.

"If you only knew Jesus" Felicitas and her 7 sons. Rome AD 161

To both, Felicitas's words were frank and direct: "You do not move me with either your flattering words and promises nor am I intimidated by your threats; because I have experienced in my own heart the workings of the Holy Spirit who gives me a living power and prepares me for the struggles of torture so that I can endure anything that you might do to me and hold fast to the confession of my faith."

Seeing that he was wasting his time to push them further at this point, Publius then sent them away to think over their decisions. The next morning he summoned them as he sat in the square before the temple of Mars.

From here he took a different tack. "Very well, then, Felicitas, if you are satisfied to die, then die alone, but have a mother's pity and compassion on your sons and instruct them at least to save their own lives by sacrificing to the gods."

Felicitas bristled at this. "Your 'compassion' is pure wickedness! And your advice is nothing but cruelty, for if my sons sacrifice to the gods, they will not save their lives but surrender them to the hellish fiends who are your gods! They would become their slaves and be chained in darkness for everlasting fire." Then she turned to her sons. "Remain steadfast in your faith and in your confession. Jesus and His saints are waiting for you in heaven. Therefore, fight bravely for your souls and show that you are faithful in the love of Christ, the love with which He loves you and you Him."

"Woman!" the prefect interrupted. "How dare you defiantly encourage your sons to defy the commands of the emperor under my very nose! Isn't it better that you instruct them to obedience rather than rebelliousness?"

But Felicitas knew what she was saying and what kind of death would probably result from her boldness. Yet she still persisted. Rather than condemning the prefect, though, she turned to him tenderly and bravely to try to ring him to the Truth. "Prefect, if you only knew our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and the power of His divinity and majesty, you would know better than to try to draw us away from Him, and you would stop this persecution! You would know that we cannot curse Him or turn away from Him, for anyone who curses Christ and His faithful ones curses God Himself, who by faith lives in our hearts."

At this the guard that stood by her turned to her and struck her hard with his fist across her mouth, hoping to silence her, but even at this she continued to wan her sons against denying their faith and to fear neither torture nor painful death, as these were nothing compared to an eternity with Jesus in heaven.

Publius had Felicitas and her sons taken away, then brought each of the young men back one by one to question them privately. Yet whatever he promised or threatened, none of them would turn from Jesus.

Frustrated at his failure, he sent a note to the emperor that they all remained obstinate in their confession of Jesus. The emperor then sentenced them all to die at the hands of different executioners, and that Felicitas would die last of all, after she had watched each of her sons die first. Over the next four months these sentences were carried out.

Januarius, the eldest, went first while the others were forced to watch. He was scourged with a whip made up of cords that had a small ball of lead at the end of each strand. He was beaten with this on the back, neck, sides, and any other fleshly part of the body the torturer could reach with the scourge until he no longer moved.

Felix and Philippus, the next two oldest, followed. They were beaten to death with rods.

Sylvanus was tossed down from a great height.

The youngest three, Alexander, Vitalus, and Martialis, were each brought before their mother separately and beheaded. Last of all, with tears glistening in her eyes at both the pain of watching her sons die and the anticipation of soon being with them again before Christ, Felicitas was beheaded with a sword.****

It is one thing to believe in a cause so much that we are willing to die for it, but it is quite another to believe in it so much that we would let others suffer and die for it, especially if they are our own children and family. For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16

It has oft been said that fear is the opposite of faith. As faith motivates us toward something, fear makes us cower away from it. Faith in ourselves is key to all endeavors; fear of failure often leads to not trying something in the first place. Faith in God frees us to talk about Him; fear of man keeps our mouths shut worrying about what others will think.

Faith liberates. Fear incapacitates. However, there is one type of fear that does free us; the fear of God. In this modern era where we want to call Jesus our friend and think of God as our helper, the concept of the fear of the Lord gets explained away in a lot of different ways as a healthy respect for God or an awe and reverence for who He is. But the fear of God is more than that. It is not a fear like the fear of heights or the fear of getting mugged along a dark street. It is a revelation of who God really is in all of His power as the creator of the universe. It is a revelation of the God to whom the devil and all of his forces are an insignificant bother. It is the fear that Jesus talked about in Matthew 10:28 when He told us not to fear those who can kill the body and not the soul, but fear Him who can destroy both soul and body in hell.

If we have this fear of God, who is on our side, then how can we ever fear what people might think? How can we ever disobey Him for fear of what others might do? How can we really fear anything on this earth ever again? Strange as it may sound, the fear of God sets us free from fear itself.

Jesus is the Liberator. Faith in Him, and holy fear of Him, enables us to try what others have called impossible.

- 6. Read I Peter 3:18. Peter shares the example of Christ who is the supreme picture of doing right and suffering for righteousness sake. How does I Peter 3:18 explain the gospel?
- Read I Peter 3:19-21. This is a very difficult passage with many suggested interpretations. When encountering a passage like this it is important to ask yourself some key questions as you seek to understand it. Here are a few. 1. What do other Scriptures say about this topic?
 What does it mean in the context of the passage where it is found? 3. What do the key or significant words in the passage mean?

Two plausible explanation for the meaning of this passage are these:

(1) In the New Testament, the word "spirits" is used to describe angels or demons, not human beings... nowhere in the Bible are we told that Jesus visited hell. Acts 2:31 states that He went to "Hades" NASB but "Hades" is not hell. The word "Hades" refers to the realm of the dead, a temporary place where they await resurrection...(see Revelation 20:11, 15) Hell is the permanent and final place

of judgment for the lost. Hades is the temporary place. When a Christian dies, he goes to neither place, but to heaven to be with Christ (Philippians 1:20-24).

...The word translated 'preached" simply means "to announce as a herald, to proclaim." It is not the word that means to preach the gospel... Peter did not tell us what Jesus proclaimed to these imprisoned spirits, but it could not be a message of redemption since angels cannot be saved (Hebrews 2:16). It was probably a declaration of victory over Satan and his hosts. (See I Peter 3:22 and Colossians 2:15.)

(2) I understand the spirits in prison to be... human beings who were disobedient during the period of Noah's preaching... I suggest that Noah's suffering in being the butt of ridicule during his day may also be in Peter's mind, and that his suffering was also Jesus' suffering in his preincarnate state (before He was born on earth), since Noah's preaching was really Jesus preaching through Noah (see II Peter 2:5). Peter may regard our suffering as Jesus' suffering (see Colossians 1:24) and our preaching (ideally at least) as Jesus preaching to our generation...

Peter's use of this incident also makes sense in light of the fact that whenever such proclamation takes place there are two results - the condemnation of those who refuse the message and the salvation of those who receive it."

Baptism is a significant step in the life of a believer. It is especially important in countries that are not "Christian" in heritage. When I ministered in Japan many relatives of a new believer did not take their new found faith seriously until they were baptized. One young woman I knew of was thrown out of her family because she was baptized. Baptism as a public testimony of a person's faith in Christ can cause the kind of suffering Peter speaks of in I Peter.



I must go till he comes, give till I drop, preach till all know, and work till he stops me. And, when he comes for his own, he will have no problem recognizing me... my banner will be clear!"
