

Key Accomplishments

Global Partnership to End Violence Against Children & Global Fund to End Violence Against Children (End Violence) July 2016 to March 2017

Introduction: End Violence launched in July 2016. This paper identifies the key accomplishments of the Partnership since launch.

GOALS

1

BUILDING POLITICAL WILL

The Partnership will build and sustain political will to achieve the SDGs and end violence against children, promoting evidence-based strategies that will lead to significant, sustained and measurable reductions in violence.

- ✓ Signed on 13 governments as “Pathfinding Partners” and 8 governments as “Supporting Partners”.
- ✓ Supported the United Nations Secretary-General to promote End Violence, including during his Mission to Sri Lanka, September 1 and 2, 2016.
- ✓ Achieved a reference in 3 UN resolutions (Promotion and protection of the rights of children and bullying by the UNGA in 2016 and Protection of the rights of the child in the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development by the Human Rights Council in 2017).
- ✓ Supported the establishment of the African Partnership to End Violence Against Children.
- ✓ Secured the South Asian Initiative to End Violence Against Children SAIEVAC as the regional partner for End Violence in South Asia to drive countries to join End Violence, pathfind, and implement INSPIRE and the End Violence strategy.

ACCELERATING ACTION

Partners will work together to accelerate action to tackle the violence that children face, with an initial focus on countries that wish to lead the movement to end violence.

- ✓ Allocated USD \$10million to 15 projects in 14 countries - with one regional project covering South Asia - to prevent online child sexual abuse and exploitation.
- ✓ Supported 6 pathfinding governments to publish national roadmaps (Indonesia, Mexico, Nigeria, Paraguay, Sweden, Tanzania)
- ✓ Supported 6 governments to establish multi-stakeholder platforms (Jamaica, Mexico, Montenegro, Romania, Tanzania and Uganda)
- ✓ Supported 7 countries to establish national data on ending violence against children (Indonesia, Mexico, Nigeria, Paraguay, Philippines, Sweden and Tanzania).
- ✓ Published an Economic Costing Model for use by countries, which is publically available for downloading at www.end-violence.org. Using this software, Tanzania has already completed their fully costed action plan.
- ✓ Developed Country Guidance, inclusive of humanitarian and fragile settings, which is available on the End Violence website and is being used.
- ✓ Set up an INSPIRE Working Group with over 80 members to develop implementation guidance, indicators and provide technical assistance and training to countries.
- ✓ Co-organized a workshop for 7 francophone countries to strengthen focus on violence prevention in humanitarian response.
- ✓ Supported the development of the CSO engagement strategy and the participation of CSOs in pathfinding countries.

STRENGTHENING COLLABORATION

End Violence will strengthen collaboration among and between countries, and with civil society and other stakeholders. They will be encouraged to confront shared threats and develop shared solutions, acknowledging that violence against children cannot be considered in isolation from the broader context of violence. The Partnership will work with and supplement the efforts – but neither displace nor distort – the work of existing partnerships.

- ✓ Launched a ‘corporate council’ with Business leaders at Davos 2017 – IKEA, ZAIN, Ericsson and Carlson Wagonlit to join/lead. This informal council will work with End Violence, determining what actions business can take to advance the mission, vision and goals of End Violence
- ✓ Executed MOU with Together for Girls and initiated collaboration, beginning with El Salvador.
- ✓ Executed MOU with the new Child Protection in Humanitarian Action Alliance.
- ✓ Executed MOU with Girls not Brides.
- ✓ Established formal collaboration and exchange of information on pathfinding countries with the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child.
- ✓ Co-organized panel discussion with the other Child-Focused Global Partnerships (SUN, GAVI, GPE, Alliance 8.7) at the side of the Human Rights Council in March 2017.
- ✓ Negotiated collaboration with the International Pediatric Association to engage pediatricians in the End Violence mission.
- ✓ Committed the President of Malta and other European actors to a high-level discussion on violence, and children escaping conflict and crisis during the GA 2017.

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Achievements were realized under each of the 4 drivers including:

Movement Building	<ul style="list-style-type: none">✓ On-boarded new partners in +20 country level discussions.✓ Secured membership from 149 organizations (6 Academic, 128 civil society, 6 UN, 4 philanthropy and 5 private sector).✓ Secured support from 1934 individuals who have signed on as “Friends”.✓ Developed a series of PSAs with Liam Neeson and a selection of children from around the world, along with advocates for children, which has been seen online over 1.5 million times.✓ Reached 66.7K impressions on Twitter during social media campaign over 2-week period.✓ Maintained and developed the website, produced 18 blog posts, 10 newsletters with almost 2,000 subscribers, developed a portal to receive and review membership applications and host a member’s directory, with over 81,000 website visitors since launch.✓ Established working group on children and young people’s participation.
Funding	<ul style="list-style-type: none">✓ Secured a £40 million pledge from the UK Government to the Fund to End Violence Against Children.✓ Raised USD1M from private foundations.✓ Raised USD300,000 private foundation funding for a focal point for the Solutions Summit.✓ Raised USD350,000 from Swiss Government, plus a multi-year secondment.✓ Raised USD 75,000K from Canadian government (specific to child/youth participation).✓ Developed Funders Table Strategy, and a Resource Mobilization Strategy for Government and Private Sectors.✓ Negotiated new or extension of long-term secondments from 3 civil society partners (ChildFund Alliance, Save the Children, World Vision International).✓ Negotiated agreement with USAID for ‘all of USAID support’ for the implementation of INSPIRE.✓ Negotiated the establishment of a UNHCR post to be assigned to the End Violence Secretariat.

- ✓ Established Board (meeting held December 2016).
- ✓ Established Executive Committee (2 in-person, 2 virtual meetings).
- ✓ Established Steering Committee for the End Violence Fund (4 meetings).
- ✓ Supported Business Plan Working group (3 meetings).
- ✓ Supported the participation of CSOs representatives in the Board and Executive Committee meetings.

- ✓ Advertised and hired chief of office, administrative assistant, program associate.
- ✓ Advertised P5 Fund Unit, P4 M&E, P4 Advocacy and Communication and P4 Resource Mobilization. All rounds of interviews completed and offer letters in process.
- ✓ Developed Business Plan for End Violence, together with a work plan and budget for Secretariat, including the Fund Unit.
